Ariel, the youngest daughter of King Triton—merman and king of the seadreams of the world above the waves. Sebastian (crab and court musician) has composed a song introducing Triton's daughters to the court (*Daughters of Triton*), of whom Ariel is prominently featured for her lovely singing voice. Mistaking the time of her performance, Ariel, instead is in her secret grotto filled with human artifacts, longing to be a part of the human world (*Part of Your World*). Knowing it to be forbidden, Ariel goes to the surface, where she sees Prince Eric traveling by ship. She falls in love and makes a pact with Ursula, the exiled sea witch, who, in exchange for her voice, transforms Ariel into a human. As per the pact, Ariel has three days to convince Eric that she is the same girl that rescued him from his shipwreck, and that he should kiss her, or she will become a little shriveled polyp decorating Ursula's doorway. In an effort to create "the mood," Sebastian recruits various sea creatures to serenade Eric into kissing Ariel (*Kiss the Girl*).

Mulan

Mulan, quite unlike the other graceful and poised Chinese maidens of her age, just got rejected by the matchmaker because she accidentally set her on fire. Feeling the pressure of having dishonored her family name, Mulan despairs and questions her self-worth and the social expectations of her day (*Reflection*). Deciding to prove herself, she conscripts in the Imperial Army in place of her father, to defend China from the invading Huns. Forced to disguise herself as a man, Mulan undergoes rigorous training under the command of Captain Shang (*I'll Make A Man Out Of You*), whom she eventually falls in love with and marries. Mulan, due to her bravery, is able to stave off the Hun attack, sparing China certain defeat.

Belle, the beautiful daughter of an eccentric inventor, is more interested in far off places than the provincial town she lives in. Gaston, the town's most eligible bachelor/hunter/hero, has his sights set on Belle, who politely, yet firmly, refuses his proposals of marriage. New to rejection, Gaston slumps into depression. In an effort to raise his spirits, sidekick LePou uses flattery (*Gaston*). Meanwhile, Belle has gone in search of her father, who has gotten lost in the woods on his way to the fair. She finds him imprisoned in an ominous chateau occupied by quickened furniture and a terrifying Beast. Belle bargains with the Beast and buys her father's freedom with her own. Venturing into forbidden rooms of the chateau, Belle is frightened by the Beast who violently orders her to get out. Belle flees. Realizing his deadly mistake, the Beast knows he will be a monster forever if he cannot learn to love her (*If I Can't Love Her*). In the woods, Belle is attacked by wolves and is rescued by the Beast. A friendship blossoms and Belle asks the Beast to join her for dinner. They attend a lovely dinner and personal ball, where they dance together in the ballroom (*Beauty and the Beast*).

Hercules

Kidnapped as a baby by the stooges of Hades, Hercules, son of ruling god Zeus and goddess Hera, is force-fed part of a potion that turns him mortal, but allows him to retain his god-like strength. Found by a kind farmer, Hercules is brought up as a mortal boy. Abnormally strong, Hercules is a misfit and a nuisance to his neighbors, particularly after he accidentally destroys the marketplace. Questioning where he truly belongs, Hercules dreams that he is destined for great things and determines that he will do it (*Go The Distance*). Hercules is visited by his father Zeus and learns of his true identity. Desiring to join his family on Mount Olympus, Hercules learns he must first prove himself an immortal by becoming a true hero. On his journey of self-discovery and discipline, Hercules meets Meg, for whom he immediately develops a crush. Meg, however, has a secret, and is

paying off a debt to Hades, Hercules' unknown but sworn enemy. Hades uses Meg to manipulate Hercules, while Meg tries unsuccessfully to resist falling in love with him by singing *I Won't Say I'm In Love*, backed up by The Muses, Greek goddesses of the arts. Hercules defeats Hades and wins his place on Olympus, only to leave it behind to share his life with Meg.

Young Simba goes to see his uncle Scar. The scheming uncle piques the lion cub's curiosity by mentioning the elephant graveyard, a place where Simba is forbidden to go. After his young playmate Nala returns from hunting with the lionesses (*The Lioness Hunt*) Simba recruits her to accompany him. Later, Simba's father Mufasa, king of the lions, is murdered by his jealous brother Scar. Young Simba is led to believe he is to blame and runs away. Years later, Simba calls out to the night searching for answers and the father he so desperately misses (*Endless Night*). Rafiki, the baboon shamaness and spiritual leader, responds to Simba's plea, teaching him that Mufasa never died, but rather lives within (*He Lives In You*).
